



Dr Alexandra Livarda is a researcher at the Catalan Institute of Classical Archaeology (ICAC, Spain) studying human-plant interactions through time to investigate how they inform on agronomy, commerce, social structures, perceptions, and identities in the past, but also, the present. Her current research focuses on the archaeology of food and taste in the Roman and medieval world, as well as Late Bronze to Early Iron Age Aegean agriculture, and the development of new methodological tools for the identification of past agricultural practices combining experimental and computational archaeology. She has directed or (co)/directed archaeobotanical research in several projects, including some of the most emblematic sites in the Aegean, such as the Little Palace at Knossos, Crete and Lefkandi, Euboea. She has published widely on a range of topics from the emergence of agriculture to the development of tastes and food commerce in the historic past.
